

Courses

One-year 'top-up' degree

At USC, you can 'top-up' to a standard bachelor degree in one calendar year.

USC allows students, who already have a recognised tertiary award, to gain credit towards a USC bachelor degree.

In addition to undergraduate and postgraduate degrees, USC also recognises associate degrees or diplomas for credit transfer.

Studies include anatomy, physiology, biochemistry, pathophysiology, biomechanics, psychology, motor learning, and sports nutrition. Advanced courses focus on professional practice in clinical and community environments, with industry placements and workplace learning. The program is under consideration for accreditation with Exercise and Sports Science Australia.

POST-ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Before undertaking clinical placements, students must provide evidence of hepatitis B immunisation, first aid and CPR training, undertake a criminal history check, and obtain or hold a current Suitability Card. The evidence of these requirements is requested in the initial placement subject (SPX300) conducted in the third year of the Bachelor of Clinical Exercise Science. Students must complete 500 hours of supervised placement. Students may be required to undertake some clinical placement hours outside the Sunshine Coast region in metropolitan and regional/rural areas.



You develop knowledge of concepts fundamental to successful business operation including economics, business law, research methods, and information and communications technology (ICT).

You also gain specialised knowledge of accounting topics such as auditing, corporate and management accounting, taxation law and business finance.

Through a range of in-depth courses, you acquire a deeper understanding of the function of accounting in today's complex business environment. You discover the basic principles of taxation law, and the nature, scope and operation of different business structures.

You learn a range of analytic tools for costing, decision-making, planning and control. You examine contemporary accounting and disclosure issues from inception and acquisition, to trading and termination of a company. You gain a firm foundation in ICT, and explore the specific application of ICTs to accounting.

Delivery includes face-to-face lectures, tutorial participation and assessment.



Work proactively with people to address the determinants of health and wellbeing.

Based on a socio-ecological model of health, the program explores contemporary health promotion at individual, group, organisation, community and population levels. Core study concepts include public health foundations, principles of health promotion; the assessment of health needs; and the planning, implementation and evaluation of health promotion programs, health promotion settings, epidemiology and quantitative and qualitative research approaches.

The Master of Health Promotion is designed for those looking to work in designated health promotion roles, or for those wanting to develop deeper knowledge and skills in health promotion to complement their current roles.

The program gives you the flexibility to study courses on campus, online or a mixture of the two delivery modes. You can change study modes at any time during your program. Teaching, learning and assessment items develop your theoretical knowledge and understanding through the completion of practical and creative tasks.

If you choose to exit the master's program after completing eight courses (96 units), you may be awarded a Graduate Diploma in Health Promotion. Students must have completed all the requirements of the Graduate Diploma to be awarded this program. Please note that there is no direct entry into the Graduate Diploma.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

A student entering the Master of Health Promotion Program will normally be required to hold a Bachelor degree (AQF Level 7), or equivalent, from a recognised higher education institution. Entry by non-graduates who have extensive relevant industry experience may be considered on a case-by-case basis by the Head of School, School of Health and Sport Sciences.

MEMBERSHIP

Graduates are eligible for membership of the Australian Health Promotion Association, the Public Health Association of Australia, and the International Union for Health Promotion and Education.

Some courses within the Master of Health Promotion are multimodal; therefore, students may enrol in either the online or on campus offering of these courses. Multimodal study provides further flexibility whereby students can study in one or more modes simultaneously to suit work or lifestyle commitments. ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Applicants who are registered nurses registered in Australia with the Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency (AHPRA), who do not have a Bachelor qualification, may be considered for admission based on extensive industry experience and will require approval by the Program Leader.

The Master of Psychology (Clinical) trains psychology graduates in clinical psychology to meet the requirements for registration to practise as psychologists.

The program has three major components—coursework in professional and clinical psychology, supervised practicum placements, and a research project and thesis. Coursework delivery is via a combination of lectures, seminars, practical exercises, written assignments, and skills demonstration and practice.

Practicum placements involve you working as a provisional psychologist, under appropriate supervision, in a range of settings beginning in the University's Psychology Clinic. Your work is assessed through written reports, case presentations, professional portfolios and observation by supervisors and the course coordinator.

The research project involves a review of relevant literature leading to a research question, design and conduct of an appropriate study, data collection and analysis, and preparation of a thesis consisting of the literature review and a report of the research study. The thesis is assessed by independent examination.

ACCREDITATION

Accredited by The Australian Psychology Accreditation Council (APAC) and approved by The Australian Psychological Society (APS) College of Clinical Psychologists as a fifth and sixth year program in Psychology, graduates of the Master of Psychology (Clinical) are eligible to apply to the Psychology Board of Australia (PBA) for general registration.

It is therefore a vehicle that develops personal and social adaptive capacity, and can contribute substantially to social and economic wellbeing.

The Graduate Certificate in Futures Studies provides you with a sound foundational knowledge of the futures field. It introduces a range of futures methods, concepts and tools designed to help you better understand your working context and future proof your organisation. The program hones leadership skills, covers a wide range of facilitation techniques, links personal and organisational values to actions and their outcomes, and stimulates creative engagement that generates a range of alternatives to business as usual for you and your organisation.

Futures Studies is therefore about the present—the present reinvented in the light of probable, possible, and preferable futures that may occur as a result of social, technological, environmental, economic or cultural change. It hinges on flexibility of thinking, the ability to reframe context and critically assess our role in its maintenance, and to identify points of leverage that, when addressed, can lead to new possibilities. It is increasingly becoming a frame of reference for government, business, education and community development. The core business of all such sectors is an ability to manage change, anticipate, and align strategy with desired outcomes.

This program fosters strategic foresight, which is of key relevance to emerging issues facing our region and the planet. It draws on the innate capacity of the human mind to engage in foresight or futures thinking. You learn to clarify values and develop effective strategic processes to navigate a turbulent environment where success and failure impact on both present and future generations. Courses blend academic and action-based learning to bridge the divide between theory and practice. Courses are offered in fully external (online) modes.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

A student entering the Graduate Certificate program will normally be required to hold an undergraduate degree, or equivalent, from a recognised higher education institution.

Advance your career and earn a professional counselling degree.

The Master of Counselling offers preparation for a position in counselling for practitioners from a variety of backgrounds. It provides career opportunities in private practice, education, health and human service settings. It will interest professionals seeking a career change, or those wishing to fine-tune qualifications by adding vocational emphasis or gain an academic qualification to formalise years of work experience. It may also be of particular relevance to those working in education, nursing, health or human services.

This program provides practical training that leads to the acquisition of knowledge, skills, and experience in professional counselling, family therapy, and ethical practice competencies in both class and a live clinical context. A feature of the program is the experiential clinical component that takes place in Internships in Relationships Australia, Centacare and the Counselling and Research Centre at the University. This enables you to integrate counselling theory with practice in a structured and safe learning environment. Students will acquire the relevant counselling knowledge and skills by satisfactorily completing at least 200 hours of counselling and additional supervision within the Internship. Students will also undertake a Research project related to counselling practice and document this in a 10,000-12,000 word dissertation, comprising a literature review, methodology, findings and implications for further study.

The Master of Counselling will be offered to students with an approved three-year degree in Counselling (via Pathway B) or a related area such as teaching, nursing, or other human services/health related area, or a Bachelor degree in other areas approved by the University (via Pathway A). The program specialises in advanced counselling practice skills as well as specialised areas such as counselling addictions, counselling children and adolescents, counselling in mental health and expressive therapies.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

A student entering the Master of Counselling will normally be required to hold an approved three-year degree in Counselling (AQF Level 7) or a Bachelor degree (AQF Level 7) in other areas approved by the University.

Entry by non-graduates who have extensive relevant industry experience may be considered on a case-by-case basis by the Dean, Faculty of Arts and Business.

Applicants are required to complete an additional personal statement and attend an interview. Interviews for International students on a Student visa will be conducted by Skype.

REQUIREMENTS FOR PLACEMENTS

You must hold a current Blue Card[#] before starting your first supervised counselling experience. Blue Card applications should be submitted with your application to USC. If you do not submit an application, or apply but are ineligible, you will not be able to undertake the professional experience components of the program. Many agencies also require a police check in addition to the Blue Card.

Become an accredited practitioner and create a more socially just world.

The Master of Social Work (Qualifying)[†] prepares professionals to work with individuals, families, groups and communities across the domains of policy, practice, theory and research. It creates a new pathway for entry into the social work profession and provides opportunities for you to advance in your career and move between different forms of employment.

The program follows the accreditation requirements of the Australian Association of Social Workers (AASW) and delivers requisite knowledge, values and skills for the social work profession. You complete ten 12-unit courses plus two 36-unit (490-hour) field education placements.

In the coursework component, you gain a critical understanding of society and how it has developed and is organised; knowledge of social welfare arrangements, their history and organisation, and related law in Australia; and knowledge of the individual, including human behaviour and development, personality development, life cycle stages, family and social networks, physical health and ill-health, mental health, disability, vulnerability and resilience.

Your field education placements (980 hours) provide extensive field education and experience, and enable you to integrate social work theory and practice-based learning in a structured, safe and supported learning environment. You must complete the field education placements to graduate. You may be required to undertake a criminal history check and apply for a Blue Card[#]. You must have your own means of transport.

As a graduate you will be well prepared to work in government organisations, community agencies and private practice in both local and international contexts. As a practitioner, you will be proficient in critically analysing

and formulating creative responses to social, political, cultural, historical or gendered disadvantage faced by vulnerable citizens through various modes of practice, such as case management, counselling, policy analysis and development, organisational management, social action, advocacy, community development, education and research.

Depending on your educational history, there are two pathways of entry into this master's program. Generally, applicants will have a completed bachelor degree deemed relevant by the Faculty to social work. Other applicants who hold a bachelor's degree without any social, health or behavioural science background, will need to complete, prior to entry, three specified foundation courses in social work, sociology and psychology. If you are required to complete the prerequisite courses, you can do so either as a Visiting Student or by enrolling in the Graduate Certificate in Arts. Depending on your course selection, you can complete these requirements across one or two semesters.

ACCREDITATION

The Master of Social Work (Qualifying) is fully accredited by the Australian Association of Social Workers (AASW).

MEMBERSHIP

Graduates will be eligible for membership to the AASW and to practise as professional social workers. Membership to the AASW enables you to apply to become a mental health accredited practitioner, which attracts a Medicare rebate for private practitioners.

English language requirements

At USC, all lectures and tutorials are delivered in English.

If English is not your first language, you need to meet the minimum English requirements for your chosen program. This requirement applies to all students intending to study at USC.

The following information outlines the ways in which you may demonstrate English language proficiency and the minimum achievement levels for USC program entry.

USC's English Language Programs may also help international students reach the required level.

USC has standard requirements that apply to most of its programs. In a small number of cases there are non-standard, program-specific requirements.

Table 1 specifies the standard requirements that will be accepted for most undergraduate and postgraduate programs.

Table 2 specifies the standard requirements that will be accepted for enabling programs, eg Tertiary Preparation Pathway.

Table 3 specifies the non-standard requirements that apply for specific undergraduate and postgraduate programs including the following:

- Bachelor of Occupational Therapy
- Bachelor of Nursing Science
- Bachelor of Nursing Science: Graduate Entry
- Bachelor of Nursing Science / Bachelor of Midwifery
- Bachelor of Nutrition and Dietetics

This list is not exhaustive. Other proof of English proficiency may be considered and applications are assessed individually.

English proficiency test results are regarded as valid for two years from the test date.

There are some USC postgraduate coursework programs that are attached to Table 1, but have entry requirements that vary from the standard requirements for postgraduate coursework programs.

Those programs include:

- Master of Professional Accounting—Refer to Table 1, column heading 'Undergraduate (including undergraduate Study Abroad)'. English language entry requirements for this program are the same as those for undergraduate programs as specified in Table 1.
- Master of Social Work (Qualifying)—IELTS (Academic) Overall score of 6.5 with minimum 6.5 in the writing and speaking subtests and minimum 6.0 in reading and listening subtests (or equivalent).

Successful completion of USC's Tertiary Preparation Pathway (TPP), with a minimum grade of Credit (C) for TPP101, will satisfy USC's English entry requirements for programs covered under Table 1.

Students progressing from TPP to an undergraduate program who do not achieve a 'credit' grade for TPP101, or who will progress to a program specified in Table 3, will need to demonstrate English Language proficiency required for entry to that program as indicated in Table 1 and Table 3 as applicable.

An IELTS, or approved alternative, test may be required for your Student visa application, depending on your country of citizenship and the program for which you apply.

These requirements are separate from the English requirements for admission to the University, and may be more demanding than the University's entry requirements.

* OSHC is compulsory for all students who study in Australia on a Student visa and must be maintained for the duration of that visa. Cover will be with USC's preferred provider, OSHC Allianz Global Assistance. Students may arrange their own cover, but will not receive a refund from USC if they do so. USC requires all students who request USC to arrange OSHC on their behalf to pay for visa-length cover. Failure to maintain valid OSHC constitutes a breach of Student visa conditions and may impact on the validity of the Student visa. Students are individually responsible for ensuring their OSHC is current at all times. Cover by USC's preferred provider is on condition that students re-enrol at USC from semester/ trimester to semester/trimester. Students who withdraw or change providers must arrange alternative cover as they will no longer be covered. WHEN: USC accepts applications for most programs at any time of the year. However, you should try to submit your application as early as possible.

The Student visa application process takes time, so allow for this in your planning. This will help you get your visa in time to start your program.



► What happens next?

You will normally receive an email, acknowledging your application, within 48 hours. An offer is usually made within 72 hours. It may take longer if academic credit needs to be assessed, or your application is incomplete. Delays will occur, if you do not include all required supporting documentation.

► Your offer

Once your application has been assessed, and your eligibility for the program confirmed, you will receive an offer. If you have applied for academic credit transfer, you will also receive advice about any credit awarded.

Step 4 Accept your offer

To accept your offer:

- complete and return your Response to Offer form (included in your official letter of offer)
- accept your academic credit transfer (if applicable)
- pay your first semester/trimester tuition fees

When you accept your offer and pay your tuition fees, USC International will give you your USC Network login details, so you can enrol.

At this stage, you will also be given a Confirmation of Enrolment (CoE) if you are applying for a Student visa.

Students studying on a visa other than a Student visa, eg Working Holiday visa or Electronic Travel Authority will not require or receive a CoE.

Step 5 Arrange your visa

Visas

If you're not an Australian or New Zealand citizen, or an Australian permanent resident, you'll need a visa that allows study before you can enter Australia and undertake that study.

Depending on your program, and duration of study, you can apply for a Tourist visa, Working Holiday visa, or Student visa.

If you intend to study in a program that is longer than three months, you will normally need a Student visa.

If you are studying a program for less than three months, an Electronic Travel Authority (ETA) should be suitable.

Some students may be eligible for a Working Holiday visa, which will allow study for a maximum of one semester.

If you hold a visa other than these, contact the Department of Immigration and Border Protection for advice regarding your eligibility to study.

Streamlined visa processing (SVP)—Student visa applications

SVP is now available for prospective international students with a CoE from USC at Bachelor, Masters or Doctoral degree level.

Under SVP arrangements, Student visa applications:

- are assessed as a lower migration risk, regardless of country of origin
- have reduced 'evidentiary requirements' (documentation) and faster processing periods



Post study work arrangements—temporary graduate visa

Do you want to live and work in Australia after you graduate?

You may be eligible to apply for a Temporary Graduate (subclass 485) visa.

The Temporary Graduate (subclass 485) visa Post-Study Work stream lets you work, study and travel in Australia temporarily for 2, 3 or 4 years after graduating, depending on whether you complete a bachelor's or master's degree by coursework, master's degree by research, or doctoral degree, respectively.

You may be eligible if you:

- are younger than 50 years of age
- are in Australia
- applied for, and were granted, your first student visa to Australia on or after 5 November 2011
- meet the 2-year study requirement
- have at least competent English, and
- hold an eligible qualification

To meet the two-year study requirement you must have completed at least one course registered on CRICOS, that resulted in the award of a bachelor's, master's or doctoral degree that was:

- conducted in English
- at least two full-time academic years (minimum 92 CRICOS weeks) in duration
- lawfully completed in no less than 16 months, and
- completed at an Australian educational institution in Australia.

Academic Credit Transfer

If you have partly or fully completed a recognised course or program at a tertiary institution in your home country or in Australia, you might be eligible for academic credit transfer.

This could reduce the number of courses you need to complete your USC degree.

Full-time study

If you're on a Student visa, you must complete your program within the registered duration of the program, which means you must normally be enrolled in a full-time workload.

A standard full-time workload for most programs is four courses per semester (study period).

Contact hours

A full-time award level student spends 12 hours per week in classes (lectures, tutorials or practicals) and should spend between 20 and 40 hours per week studying outside classes.

Assessment

Individual course assessment items are specified in the course outlines available through the USC portal once you've enrolled.

Undergraduate and postgraduate students may be assessed by examination; regular assessment through assignments, essays or presentations; or through a combination of these.

Honours students are assessed on their coursework and thesis. Higher Degree by Research students must submit a thesis for examination by experts in the relevant field of study.

Working in Australia

Student visa holders are normally allowed to work up to 40 hours per fortnight during semester and full-time during semester breaks. Students undertaking Higher Degrees by Research have unlimited work rights.

Deferring, suspending or cancelling student enrolment after study commencement

There are limited circumstances where a student's studies may be deferred or temporarily suspended.

These are outlined in standard 13.2 of the National Code 2007 and include:

- compassionate or compelling circumstances, or
- misbehaviour by the student

A deferral or suspension of study may affect your Student visa.

In the event USC intends to suspend or cancel a student's enrolment, where that suspension or cancellation is not initiated by the student, USC will notify the student that they have 20 working days to access USC's internal appeals process.

If the student accesses the appeals process, the enrolment will not be suspended or cancelled until the internal appeals process is completed.



Services and facilities (Sippy Downs)

Accommodation—three privately owned student villages are a short walk from campus. The USC Student Guild manages an accommodation register. Student Life and Learning assists with accommodation and tenancy issues.

Applying and enrolling—Student Administration provides help and advice relating to application, enrolment, scholarships, fees, credit transfer and graduation.

Art Gallery—free admission and a diverse annual exhibition program, including showcases by computer-based design students and emerging Australian artists.

Automatic Teller Machines (ATMs)—two located on campus.

Athletics track—Olympic-standard running track, including long jump, high jump, pole vault and hammer throw.

Bookshop—the Co-op Bookshop sells books, stationery, academic software and USC merchandise.

Cafés—four eateries (Café J, Café C, the Brasserie, Sports Café) and vending machines provide a wide range of food and drinks.

Carparking—available on campus (paid and free zones). Carpool to share the ride and the cost.

Childcare—an AEIOU Early Learning Centre on campus provides 66 places for USC and community children aged six weeks to five years. A variety of other providers are located near to the University.

Computer labs—with labs open 24-hours, there are almost 700 computers across campus available for student use.

Cycle facilities—easily accessible by bicycle, the campus has a bike hub with showers and lockers, bike stations for secure parking, and repair sites with bicycle pumps and other equipment.

Disability and equity services—specialist staff and assistive learning technologies are available through Student Life and Learning if studies are affected by disability, injury or illness.

Employment services—Career Connection provides career advice, help in setting career goals and selecting areas of study, assistance in putting together a résumé, and finding a part-time job or work experience.

Financial support—Student Administration provides advice about study costs and tuition fees, HECS-HELP, SA-HELP, OS-HELP and FEE-HELP, and scholarships, bursaries and prizes. Student Life and Learning can assist with emergency loans.

Health and wellbeing services—free health activities run throughout the year, from quit smoking and flu immunisation programs to meditation, dance and relaxation classes. Student Life and Learning assists with dispute mediation, nutrition and fitness, and the needs of the gay and lesbian community. Counselling services are free and confidential for USC students.

Indigenous information and support—the Buranga Centre is a study and social space for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students. Indigenous staff provide academic services such as the Indigenous Direct Entry and Access Scheme, Indigenous Orientation Week, the national Indigenous Cadetship program and the Indigenous Tutorial Assistance Scheme.

Innovation Centre—USC's business incubator for start-up ventures. Attend networking events, gain work experience or receive support to start a business.

International student support—USC International provides information and support for international students, and is the contact point for studying overseas with USC's GO Program.

IT support and services—The Student IT Help Desk offers support in person, over the phone or via email, along with introductory tutorials. Use the 24-hour student computer laboratories, the Information Commons in the Library, or the wireless network. Connect to the internet and the University's online network for course materials, the library catalogue and video lectures.

Library—open seven days a week during semester, the Library has more than 100,000 print volumes and 60,000 digital resources, individual and group study areas, copy and print facilities, and information desk providing IT, library and academic support. Access online Library resources such as full-text journals, e-books and essential readings.

Mail and print services—for printing, photocopying, binding, and lost property needs.

Public transport—services operate between USC's bus interchange and destinations across the Sunshine Coast, seven days a week. A USC express bus service travels to select stops.

Psychology Clinic—the clinic offers free appointments to students, and is a training facility for postgraduate students in clinical psychology.

Research facilities—science labs, a sustainability research centre, sport and exercise science research facilities, and a research and learning centre at Dilli Village on Fraser Island.

Security—24 hours, every day, with after-hours vehicle escorts available. Emergency call points are located around the campus.

Shopping centre—located just over one kilometre away, Chancellor Park Marketplace has a supermarket, newsagency, bank, post office, medical centre, pharmacy, travel agent, bakery, retail and food outlets, and a tavern.

Social activities—the Uni Club is a social hub on campus open to students during semester, with a kitchen, showers, study spaces, notice boards, casual sports and weekly social events and activities. USC Sport offers free lunchtime sports. Group fitness classes can be booked through the gym. The Uni Club also has table tennis and casual hire of sports equipment.

Sport facilities—the sports precinct has a three-court indoor sports stadium, gym, outdoor courts and playing fields, athletics track and swimming pool. Take fitness classes, play free lunch-time sport during semester or join a sporting group such as the Barbarians rugby union club.

Student Guild—the USC Student Guild is run by student volunteers and delivers services for students, such as a community kitchen, emergency food and money loans, advocacy and support, second-hand textbook hub, accommodation register, and funding for clubs and societies.

Study facilities—individual and group study spaces in the Library, open study areas around the campus, and a 24-hour student room.

Swimming pool—10-lane, 50-metre heated swimming pool. Swim with a squad or on a casual basis.

Teaching facilities—lecture theatres, tutorial rooms, science labs, a nursing ward, an occupational therapy rehabilitation room, computer-based design labs, a television journalism studio, a dietetics kitchen, and dedicated teaching space for engineering and paramedic students.

Terminology

Contact hours

Contact hours are the number of hours students are expected to attend classes on campus. A full-time student spends about 12 hours per week in classes, plus between 20 and 40 hours studying per week (five to 10 hours per course).

Course/program

A course (commonly known as a subject) is a component of an award program that is normally one semester in length. Each course is generally 12 units in value. The standard enrolment for a full-time student is four courses per study period. A program (commonly known as a degree) is the complete award with which a student graduates (eg Bachelor of Arts).

Credit

Also known as Recognition for Prior Learning, credit may be applied to a USC degree for previous study (such as TAFE) or previous experience (such as employment). Use the USC credit calculator to help determine if you are eligible, or enquire at Student Administration.

Faculty/school

A faculty is an organisational area within the University devoted to particular academic programs and research (eg Faculty of Arts and Business). Each faculty is headed by a professor, known as an Executive Dean. Schools are organisational areas within a faculty (eg School of Communication in the Faculty of Arts and Business).

Full-time/part-time study

A full-time student studies at least three courses per study period. The standard full-time workload is four courses per study period. A part-time student studies either one or two courses per study period, with two courses being standard.

Lecture/tutorial

A lecture involves a member of teaching staff presenting course content to students. Most courses have one weekly lecture. A tutorial or practical (also known as workshop or lab) is a forum for discussion, interaction, presentation and debate. Tutorials and practicals often give students an opportunity for the practical application of course content.

Semester/session/trimester

The academic year is divided into two main semesters. Generally, Semester 1 runs from February to June, and Semester 2 from July to November. The summer study period (Session 8) is between late-November and mid-February. Summer courses are delivered in intensive mode. The academic year is also divided into multiple sessions and trimesters. Although these are generally for postgraduate studies, some undergraduate courses are also offered.

Undergraduate student/postgraduate student

An undergraduate student studies an associate degree, bachelor degree or honours program. A postgraduate student studies a postgraduate coursework program (eg Graduate Certificate, Graduate Diploma, Master by coursework) or a higher degree by research (eg Master by research, Doctor of Philosophy).
