& STUDY OPTIONS



BACHELOR DEGREE

A bachelor degree is usually for students who have not been to university before or who are looking to study a completely new discipline. Single degrees are either three or four years in duration (24 or 32 units). Dual degrees are usually four to five years in duration (32 or 40 units).



GRADUATE CERTIFICATE

For students who are looking to develop their skills and knowledge in a specialist area with a focus on professional development. A pathway to further postgraduate study.

Units of study: Four



GRADUATE DIPLOMA

For students who are looking to develop their skills and knowledge in a professional vocational area. More in depth study. Units of study: Eight



MASTERS BY COURSEWORK

Offers students an intensive and in depth study that will enhance their professional and vocational skills in a specialised area. **Units of study:** 12 or 16, depending on prior qualifications



SINGLE UNIT ENROLMENT

For those students who wish to commence study and gain a feel for a new career move or course area without committing to a full degree. Once successfully completed may be used as credit towards further study.

Units of study: One




RESEARCH

A research degree provides thorough training in a particular discipline area through a process of original investigation in order to increase knowledge and make an important contribution to the development of new knowledge in society. Study is undertaken by work with one or more academics with specialist expertise in that area of study. ACU offers supervised research at either masters or doctoral level.

WHY STUDY THEOLOGY AND PHILOSOPHY?

The Faculty of Theology and Philosophy takes pride in having more than 50 permanent academics, most of them full-time. Our scholars are highly respected in their fields, with international reputations. The majority of teaching academics are PhD-qualified – ensuring that you are learning from the very best. Another 60 honorary fellows, adjunct and honorary professors contribute to the Faculty's wealth of scholarship and expertise.

Theology has very practical ramifications. It relates faith, spirituality and scholarship to a concern for human flourishing, the common good, the dignity of the human person, and stewardship of the environment and all creation.

It is particularly relevant to those professions that are committed to promoting human flourishing – such as pastoral care, counselling, chaplaincy, teaching, social work, psychology, justice and peace, advocacy, humanitarian aid and development – within the Church, in faithbased agencies and in the charitable sector.

Philosophy looks at vast and profound questions that are not only intrinsically interesting, but also life enriching. Students report finding philosophical thinking and discussion always fascinating, sometimes exhilarating, often confusing, occasionally confronting, but always providing new ways of thinking about the world and their place within it.

Both theology and philosophy equip students with skills in analysis and critical thinking, rigorous argument, academic writing, and independent research – all highly valued by employers. Further, they provide new perspectives, tools and ideas that can deepen other fields of study.

INSTITUTE FOR RELIGION AND CRITICAL INQUIRY

Australian Catholic University's Institute for Religion and Critical Inquiry promotes interdisciplinary and collaborative research in the areas of philosophy and theology and in other disciplines that enrich and extend the traditional forms of philosophy and theology.

The Institute has set its sights on the highest standards of intellectual work at an international level, seeking creativity and originality as well as rigour and thoroughness in its scholarship.

There are five focus areas of research:

- Biblical and Early Christian Studies explores the origins and development of Christianity. It fosters and develops the systematic study of early Christian literature from the first to the eighth centuries, in the areas of history, philosophy, theology, ethics, politics and social issues.
- Catholic Thought and Practice, including inter-religious dialogue, incorporates the ongoing investigation of questions and issues pertaining to belief in the divine – and the nature and place of humanity in the world – which each generation encounters at one time or another.
- Moral Philosophy and Applied Ethics focuses on questions concerning the origins and nature of moral value, theoretical frameworks for the discernment of this value (including interrogation of particular normative ethical models), and particular areas of applied ethics such as healthcare ethics, bioethics, political and social ethics at an individual and a communal level.
- Philosophy and Phenomenology of Religion incorporates research on questions concerned with the complex relationship between faith and reason, particularly as this has been understood through the history of western philosophy and philosophical theology, and as this history has been received and mediated in our own times.
- Religion and Society explores the beliefs, practices and organisational forms of religion, from an awareness that there are diverse views regarding the place and role of religion both in the public arena (political, economic and media) and in particular community settings.

The Institute currently has more than 35 members across the five focus areas, who are working on 10 funded research projects. These cover topics such as Biblical Studies: The origin, purpose and reception of the New Testament writings; Faith on the Move: Christianity and the Intercultural Church; Absolute Idealism in Western and Eastern Philosophical and Religious Thought; and Religion and the Law (Shari'a). These projects involve collaboration with national and international partners.

Dr Stewart Braun obtained his Doctorate in Philosophy from the University of Virginia in 2012 and joined ACU in 2013. He specialises in social and political philosophy, concentrating specifically in the areas of distributive justice and on the liberal account of rights.

Prior to obtaining his PhD, Dr Braun studied philosophical theology at Yale University where he obtained a Master of Arts in Religion. He is currently engaged in a project to determine the proper focus for egalitarian accounts of distributive justice.

Dr Michael P. Theophilos is a Lecturer in Biblical Studies and Ancient Languages. He is currently writing a volume for the *Papyrologische Kommentare zum Neuen Testament* [Papyrological Commentary on the New Testament] series, to be published by Vandenhoeck & Ruprecht, Göttingen. This work, and much of his research, focuses on the corpus of Greek papyri, ostraca and tablets that are able to illuminate the historical, social and linguistic contexts of the New Testament.

Dr Theophilos has lectured in North America, Europe, the Middle East and the Asia Pacific region. In 2012 he was awarded an Office for Learning and Teaching Citation for Outstanding Contributions to Student Learning, for the adoption of innovative and exciting approaches to teaching biblical languages and history.

Dr Maeve Louise Heaney was born in Dublin, Ireland, and is a consecrated missionary of a Catholic institute for consecrated life, the Verbum Dei Missionary Fraternity.

Dr Heaney completed a bachelor degree in theology at the Instituto Teológico San Pablo Apóstol, in Madrid, affiliated with the Pontifical Urbanian University, and her licentiate and doctorate at the Pontifical Gregorian University in Rome. During that time, she taught at both the Gregorian and at the Rome base of the Catholic University of Dallas.

From 2011 to 2012 she was the Bannan Fellow at Santa Clara University, California, teaching at the Jesuit School of Theology in Berkeley. As a musician and composer, she interweaves the fields of theological aesthetics, spirituality and the arts.



DR CLARE JOHNSON
SENIOR LECTURER, LITURGICAL
STUDIES AND SACRAMENTAL
THEOLOGY

Before joining ACU in mid-2009, Dr Clare Johnson taught at Notre Dame (USA) from 2000-2005 and the University of Notre Dame Australia from 2005-2009. She was awarded an ACU teaching citation in 2013.

Dr Johnson's research has been published in numerous refereed journals and she is editor of Ars Liturgiae: Worship, Aesthetics and Praxis - Essays in Honor of Nathan D. Mitchell (Chicago: LTP, 2003) and contributing co-editor of Vatican II: Reception and Implementation in the Australian Church (Mulgrave VIC: Garrett, 2012). She is assistant editor of Studia Liturgica and editorial board member of the Australian Journal of Liturgy.

Dr Johnson is a member of the National Liturgical Council advising the Australian Catholic Bishops' Commission for Liturgy and frequently presents workshops on liturgy and liturgical music for dioceses and Catholic Education Offices. She is the founding director of the ACU Strathfield Choir.



DR CHRIS HACKETT RESEARCH FELLOW AND LECTURER, PHILOSOPHY

Dr W. Chris Hackett is a Research Fellow and Lecturer in the Faculty of Theology and Philosophy, and a member of the Institute for Religion and Critical Inquiry. He spent the 2010-2011 academic year in France as *pensionnaire étranger* at the École Normale Supérieure in Paris. He received a PhD in Philosophical Theology from the University of Virginia in 2011 and joined ACU in 2012.

Dr Hackett specialises in contemporary French thought. He is presently completing a monograph on 'meta-philosophy' as a theological problematic.



DR ALAN CADWALLADER
SENIOR LECTURER,
BIBLICAL STUDIES

Dr Alan Cadwallader is a Senior Lecturer in Biblical Studies, with specialist interest in Mark's Gospel, Deutero-Pauline letters, archaeology (especially epigraphy), critical theory, Bible translation and contemporary (especially ecological and gender) hermeneutics.

He has published widely in each of these areas, most especially in the critical analysis of Mark's Gospel, the archaeology of ancient Colossae and the politics of the translation of the Revised Version.

Dr Cadwallader is currently working on a commentary on Mark's Gospel for the Earth Bible Project, a critical edition of the story of St Michael of Chonai (Colossae) and the Revised Version of the New Testament. His book, *Beyond the Word of a Woman* (ATF Press, 2008) won the Australian Theology Book of the Year in 2009.

"I work as a General Practitioner and had been involved in music and liturgy in parishes for many years, but had no formal knowledge of the subject. I met Dr Clare Johnson briefly at a meeting of the Australian Pastoral Musicians Network (APMN) and decided to build on my previous theology studies at ACU with a Graduate Certificate in Theological Studies (Liturgy).

Unlike most of the participants in the course, I don't work as a teacher, nor do I have a formal or paid role in the Church. I suspect I will remain involved as an amateur volunteer working with music and liturgy. That, in Australia at least, is the usual state of affairs in most parishes. It would therefore be ideal if as many people in that role as possible had the same opportunity I have had to get a better grounding in the ministry of liturgy preparation and liturgical music.

The course benefited greatly from Dr Johnson's passion and wide knowledge and experience in both liturgy and music. Advances in online technology make this course an enhanced experience compared with those offered in the past. While the virtual classrooms are not yet perfect, the chance for interaction with the lecturer and fellow students is a great asset.

My involvement in music liturgy and being part of a team selecting music for the parish is now a vastly more informed participation. Knowing what is possible and what is permissible, knowing why things are done in a certain way and seeing liturgy as an engine of formation has broadened my appreciation and understanding. I hope to use the skills learnt in the course over the coming decades in my local parish."

"After a period of 10 years I was drawn back to further postgraduate studies by a course, that by all indications, appeared to be the perfect answer to my growing personal and professional needs. The Graduate Certificate in Theological Studies (Liturgy) has provided me not only with the knowledge that I was seeking, but also with an increased drive to continue studying and build upon the solid foundations I have attained.

I found the program to be a fascinating, purposeful course that ignited my spirit and opened both my heart and mind to our Catholic inheritance. Each unit offered an opportunity to acquire a deeper insight into the traditions, doctrine and documents of the Catholic Church.

As a teacher, parish liturgy assistant and devoted Christian, this course captivated me from the outset. All units presented a rich practical element that applied links to parish and school settings, allowing students to assimilate theory into practice. The Graduate Certificate in Theological Studies (Liturgy) clearly embraces the essence of Vatican II, rousing the Church, inspiring God's faithful."

"I have been involved as a volunteer in youth ministry since I left school and I have always enjoyed it. Now I do it for a living and I love it even more.

I am currently employed by the Archdiocese of Canberra & Goulburn to provide ministry support services to the local area. I appreciate the diversity of my role as each day presents a new opportunity to make a difference. My job could have me based out at Yass in one of the high schools, organising a youth group for a local parish, or supporting ministry events at ACU's Canberra Campus.

Last year I was responsible for leading a pilgrimage of more than 50 young people to the Australian Catholic Youth Festival (ACYF) in Melbourne. The months of preparation really paid off when I was able to see them engaging in such an amazing, life-changing experience.

NATHAN LYONS
MASTER OF PHILOSOPHY
IN PHILOSOPHY

"I am in my second year of a Doctor of Philosophy at ACU in Philosophy. What drew me to ACU was the unique opportunity to further my research in the area of phenomenology (study of structures of consciousness as experienced from the first-person point of view).

The Faculty of Theology and Philosophy is the only place in Australia where I could rigorously pursue a dissertation on the philosopher Edmund Husserl. Not only are ACU's philosophers active in this small region of scholarship but the Faculty hosts an ongoing stream of visiting professors and leading scholars from the US, UK and France. In fact, the richly diverse seminar series run by the newly formed Institute for Religion and Critical Inquiry has been a highlight in my academic calendar this year. Being situated in Sydney far from the Centre has had its challenges, but videoconferencing has enabled my participation in these seminars.

I have also received great support from the Faculty to spend part of this degree overseas to deepen my studies, learn a new language, and attend a number of conferences where my work has been presented to a range of different audiences in Portugal, France, the US and Canada. These experiences have been invaluable. "

"I studied a Master of Philosophy at ACU and will graduate in September 2014. I came to ACU after a bizarre and serendipitous crossing of intellectual paths. I had studied the work of Professor Kevin Hart in my honours thesis and was toying with the idea of postgraduate research in philosophy when I heard that Professor Hart would be leading ACU's new Centre for the Phenomenology and Philosophy of Religion. I immediately applied and was accepted into the Master of Philosophy.

I studied the different ways that contemporary thinkers Jean-Luc Marion and John Millbank inherit Heidegger's philosophy in a theological context: what is the nature of 'being' for Christian theology? Keeping up with Marion and Milbank's footnotes alone meant I had to read bits and pieces from the entire Western tradition - quite a steep learning curve! I learned more intensely than I ever have before and it was immensely enjoyable. Towards the end of my candidature my supervisors Dr Nick Trakakis and Dr Chris Hackett made some insightful suggestions that led me to shoot for a somewhat more ambitious, more constructive goal with my thesis, and I am particularly grateful for their guidance at that point.

In September 2014 I'm moving to Cambridge University to start a PhD in Philosophy of Religion. The expertise and support of the staff at ACU made it possible for me to get a spot (and a scholarship!) at Cambridge. My time at ACU confirmed what had long been an uncertainty for me: would I actually like doing graduate study? My time there was so much fun it banished any lingering doubts about pursuing a PhD."

& LOCATIONS

Study mode is the way in which a course or unit is delivered.

ACU offers a number of flexible delivery options to suit your family and work commitments.

FULL-TIME

To be regarded as full-time, a student must be undertaking a load of at least 0.75 EFTSL. For example, in a course with the standard annual credit point load of 80 credit points, to be enrolled full-time a student must undertake at least 30 credit points per semester.

PART-TIME

A part-time student is one who undertakes a load of less than 0.75 EFTSL. For example, in a course with the standard annual credit point load of 80 credit points, a part-time student would undertake less than 30 credit points per semester.

ONSHORE

Delivered at an ACU campus.

OFF-CAMPUS

Delivered at another location.

OFFSHORE

Delivered at an overseas location.

ONLINE

Delivered online from an ACU campus.

ATTENDANCE

Primarily attendance, either face-to-face or via video conference, at an ACU campus or another location.

MULTI-MODE

Some online with a compulsory attendance component (including examinations etc).

INTENSIVE

Units are delivered in a block over consecutive weekdays and/or weekends.

ONLINE

Fully online (including assessments).

thinking on just about anything. People have always asked big questions about the world, our place within it, and ultimate values like justice, goodness, freedom, truth and beauty. Some of the major philosophical topics include thinking about the nature of reality (metaphysics); what it is to be a human being (philosophical anthropology); knowledge and truth (epistemology); moral right and wrong (ethics); justice (social and political philosophy; philosophy of law); God (philosophy of religion and philosophical theology); language (philosophy of language), and much else besides. A philosophy major (or minor) can be completed at Brisbane, Melbourne or Strathfield within the Bachelor of Arts or the Bachelor of Theology. It is also possible to complete a number of philosophy units within the Bachelor of Psychological Science. Many other courses also allow you to take one or more philosophy units.
